The Guwahati Gana Seva Society is the social work wing of the Archdiocese of Guwahati having its principal office at Peace Centre, G.N.B. Road, Ambari, Guwahati. The society was formed in 1992 with the aim of supporting and empowering the poor and marginalized section of people irrespective of their caste, creed or religion living in the operational areas of the Archdiocese.

The Society lays its focus on livelihood promotional activities among rural farmers with sustainable farming practices and initiating Agri product marketing, group wise viable income generation activities among the rural SHG women and vocational trainings for school dropout and unemployed tribal youth. It also tries to tap various Govt. schemes and benefits for the target groups



Revival and Strengthening of Traditional Socio-Economic, Governance and Health systems through People-Led Development (PLD): Farm Northeast Phase- IV

Supported by Misereor & Caritas India

It is a sustainable intervention to empower and strengthen rural farmers with basic knowledge of organic and eco-friendly farming, and enhanced resilience on climate change adaptation. Three years sustainable development activities are prepared to educate and empower 892 rural farming families covering a total population of 3632. The goal and objectives are designed to facilitate and enable the rural farming families to attain a reasonable economic status of the family, ensured food security and self-sufficiency, a sustainable use of natural resources through various traditional methods and organic farming techniques, enhanced resilience on climate change adaptation, and a market linkage for excess products. This sustainable project intervention has been funded by Misereor and facilitated by Caritas India.





- The young farmers are motivated on farming activities and planted 500 lemon trees and 500 apple berry plants on 0.66-acre plot of land.
- Cultivation of Napier grass is promoted among the rural farmers. The six farmers initiated Napier grass cultivation in 5 bighas of land and enhanced livestock rearing.
- The famers learned the benefits of indigenous seeds and its resilient potentiality to adapt any climate change environment. The indigenous seeds are promoted and used by the farmers through seed saving and exchange programs.
- ❖ A group of skilled famers have initiated bee keeping with the support of 10 bee boxes after the orientation and training on bee keeping.
- Small Scale Farmers are motivated to establish community seed banks and preserve, exchange and utilize indigenous seeds.
- The multifunctional storages of low-cost cooling chambers are constructed for rural farmers to facilitate preservation of indigenous seeds and storing variety of agricultural products
- ❖ 155 rural farmers are supported with foxtail millet seeds and promoted a climate resilient crop cultivation.
- ❖ The rural farmers are trained on weed composting techniques and 120 farmers promoted weed compost organic manure for organic farming and marketing.
- ❖ Weed & Vermin Composting organic manure are harvested by the rural farmers and utilized in the organic farming.
- ❖ Bio-Pest Repellents are promoted by the rural farmers for organic farming and marketing.
- ❖ Farmers' groups are supported with 15260 fruit tree saplings and developed a multi-tiered orchard garden.
- Irrigation facility from the stream water is channelized through water pipe and enhanced the farmers' seasonal agricultural activities.
- The village community and students planted 4150 tree saplings to raise awareness on the restoration of natural eco-system and preservation of environment in 12 project villages.
- Traditional knowledge on preparing kolakhar with locally available resources was revived among the farmers.
- ❖ A farmers' market is established at Amsoi Gate near national highway and facilitated direct sales of agricultural products for the rural famers.
- The support of 90 kg Black rice and 80 kg Batiasora have been utilized as revolving support from one farmers' group to another new group according to the season.
- ❖ 130 farming families have actively involved in the process of preparing bio-pest repellent and the products are being used for organic farming and marketing.

❖ 300 rural famers have fully involved in the cultivation of vegetable by using 22 varieties of indigenous seeds.



Ecological Hostels, Kitchen Garden and Preservation of Bio-Diversity for 26 Hostels of the Archdiocese of Guwahati/India – Phase – III (Promotion of Food Security)

Supported by Kindermissionswerk, Germany

The sustainable intervention of the project activities has determined to educate the young children on organic farming and conservation of bio-diversity. The project has been educating the children of 26 target hostels and 13 schools on the relevance of organic farming and environment. The objective of the project intervention has enhanced the knowledge and learning of the children on the importance of organic farming, care and preservation of bio-diversity, sustainable use of natural resources and creating eco-friendly environment, and urgent need of being responsible persons to contribute towards the conservation of the mother earth. The children are taught on the ill effects of inorganic farming and positive aspects of organic farming on human health and environment. The intervention of project, "Ecological Hostels, Kitchen Gardens and Preservation of Bio-Diversity for 26 Hostels of the Archdiocese of Guwahati/India – Phase – III (Promotion of Food Security)', has influenced the young minds with relevant knowledge on organic farming and conservation of bio-diversity.

- The children of target hostels are taught on the benefits and techniques of plastic mulching.
- ❖ 19 varieties of vegetable seeds and 7 varieties of fruit tree saplings are cultivated and planted in the ecological hostel kitchen gardens of 26 hostels and the children are able to consume organic vegetables.
- The motivation on the importance of contributing and preserving environment is given to the children through tree plantation on different occasions.
- ❖ 1348 students of 13 schools are made aware with the knowledge of organic farming and its positive relevance on human health and environment.
- ❖ 686 hostel children, hostel gardeners and hostel wardens have learned the basic knowledge and process of organic farming
- The process and techniques of bio-pest repellent are taught to the 683 hostel children and gardeners.
- ❖ 713 hostel inmates have learned the process of plastic mulching and vermin composting.
- ❖ The bio-pest repellant and vermin composting manure are produced and utilized by the hostel children in the organic farming.
- The quiz and poster making competitions are organized for the children to create awareness on the preservation of environment and sustainable farming practices.
- The knowledge on bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste materials, clean and plastic zone free campus is shared with the students.
- ❖ 1050 students of 13 schools have planted 4000 tree saplings of different varieties in the school campus and the road side on the observation of Environmental Day and contributed to the preservation of biodiversity.
- The organic farms are developed in target hostels and the hostel children are able to consume fresh vegetables from the kitchen gardens. It has reduced dependency on market vegetables and the cost of purchasing market vegetables.
- ❖ The best 5 farms are awarded for their active participation and successful development of ecological hostel kitchen gardens.

Strengthening Disaster Resilience and Community Preparedness on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) in 13 Vulnerable Villages of Morigaon District of Assam, North East India.



The communities living in the flood prone areas are susceptible to the effects of natural disasters. The intervention of DRR project determined to empower and educate those vulnerable communities who are deprived of basic knowledge and skills to combat the effects of disasters. The strengthening project activities have contributed in enabling the vulnerable communities to realize their inner potentials and build their resilient capacity to face unforeseen natural calamities. Hence, an opportunity has been created by the project interventions for the vulnerable sections of the population to be strengthened and learn to identify different elements of vulnerabilities. They are enriched with different relevant knowledge of sustainable livelihoods, life-saving skills and skills of community preparedness for emergency disaster response. The intervention of project, 'Strengthening Disaster Resilience and Community Preparedness on DRR in 13 Vulnerable Villages of Morigaon District of Assam, Northeast India', has empowered the vulnerable communities to be more aware of their vulnerable living conditions and the potentials to grow and improve the sustainable livelihoods even in the midst of unpredictable natural disasters.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Basic knowledge on the concept of DRR project and its relevant objectives are disseminated to 100 representatives of 13 target villages.
- ❖ The members of task force groups, 1036 community members and 75 school children are enhanced with lifesaving skills through mock drill trainings facilitated by SDRF team.
- 13 Vulnerable villages have received 130 lifejackets, 13 mega-phones, 13 torchlights, 39 lifebuoys, 390 meters of nylon rope, 13 first aid kits to combat the effects of natural disasters during emergency.
- A good rapport is built with the PRI members and other govt. line departments and relevant information on existing available govt. support schemes is disseminated to the communities.
- The vulnerable farmers are empowered with the knowledge of adapting and promoting alternative resilient crops with scientific methods to improve their livelihood.
- 13 times PDRA exercises are done to educate 872 community members and vulnerable elements of the village communities have been identified and prioritized.
- ❖ 559 community members, self-help groups, youth clubs are mobilized and 13 task force groups are formed in the project villages



Improving Access to Comprehensive Maternal and Child Health Services; and for Disease and Conditions of Districts Level Importance in North East India (Phase-V)
Supported by Misereor, Germany

The implementation of the project, "Improving access to comprehensive maternal and child health services; and for diseases/conditions of district level importance", among the rural village communities have provided basic health education and healthcare services. The objective of the project has facilitated access to comprehensive maternal and child health services for the less privilege village communities. The pregnant women, lactating mothers and children under five years are being assisted with the necessary healthcare services. The pregnant women are motivated for regular 4 ANC and institutional delivery. The growth of the children is monitored and immunized regularly. Hance, the intervention project activities have created a great awareness on the basic knowledge on health and hygiene especially on the importance of 4 ANC for pregnant women, institutional delivery, appropriate feedings, growth monitoring of the children, nutrition, immunization and treatment of various ailments. The communities of the 46 rural villages have immensely benefited from the healthcare services provided by the project interventions.

- ❖ 4621 individuals are conscientized on the importance of 4 ANC, institutional delivery, appropriate feedings, growth monitoring and immunization, healthy food and nutrition, treatment of various illness, and ill effects of superstitious belief and myths associated with the child and pregnancy.
- 20 health camps were organized for the village communities and provided free health checkup and free medical assistance.
- ❖ 26587 individual members are given awareness with the basic knowledge on good health and hygiene.
- Pregnant women are prepared for institutional delivery and 252 pregnant women gave birth in the hospital.
- ❖ 355 children are facilitated with immunization.
- ❖ 52 peer educators and health supervisors are strengthened and enhanced with the knowledge on social and behavioral change communication (SBCC).
- ❖ 1479 pregnant women have done 4 ANC.
- ❖ 1412 individuals are identified with different skin diseases and 753 are cured.


Global Program India: Poverty Reduction and Food Security, Promoting Social Inclusion of Marginalized Groups as well as Increase the Resilience to Disasters in High-Risk Areas, BMZ

Supported by Caritas Germany

The intervention of project activities among the vulnerable communities of flood prone areas had been carried with the objective of poverty reduction, food security and promotion of social inclusion of marginalized groups and increase resilience to disasters. The project had been implemented for the vulnerable communities in the flood prone areas of 20 revenue villages of Mayong and Laharighat blocks of Morigaon district of Assam supported by Caritas Germany. The target communities had been empowered and strengthened to promote sustainable livelihood in the midst of unpredictable natural disaster. They had been enhanced with the knowledge and skills to identity their own vulnerabilities and build their resilience to manage and response to any natural disaster and reduce its greater effects on their livelihoods. The intervention of DRR project had contributed to motivating the vulnerable communities to realize their own potentials and build resilient capacity to address and combat natural disasters and manage their livelihood.

- The communities and ward members developed action plan to address the issues related to flood disasters that affects the livelihoods of the village communities.
- The issues related to village communities are presented before the govt. line department with a special focus attention for interventions.
- ❖ A good rapport and collaboration had been built up with the other NGOs working in the district of project location
- ❖ The information on Disaster Risk Reduction Action Plan incorporated at GPDP had been gathered from the Gram Panchayat
- ❖ The rural village communities are motivated to participate in Gram Shabha and enhanced their knowledge on various govt. schemes available that are channelized through Gram Panchayat and other govt. line departments.

Shelter Phase II-Tribal Widows Program in Goalpara District, ASSAM

Supported by Manos Unidas, Spain

Socio-economic conditions of the poor widows in the rural communities are often overlooked and remain as a neglected matter of concern in the society. The "Shelter Phase – II Tribal Widows Program in Goalpara District, Assam", is designed to address the primary issues of socio-economic life of 110 poor rural widows who suffer from various unanswered problems of widowhood in the community. The intervention of various development project activities has contributed to the livelihoods of the 110 widows. The outcome results have empowered them to improve their social and economic life. The project intervention has created an ambient or a platform to improve their capacity and knowledge on social participation, livelihood skills and sustainable livelihood activities, relevant knowledge on household and finance management, human rights and dignity, and various supportive laws for women. Thereby, the development project activities have empowered and strengthened the 110 widows to grow and improve their poor socio-economic conditions and lead a sustainable livelihood.



- The formation of 21 Small Widows' Groups has provided a common planform for the 110 widows to share their problems with other widows and to support one another.
- ❖ 110 widows are enriched with the knowledge on household financial management and proper utilization of available resources and saving habits.
- The awareness on the harmful effects of substance abuse, domestic violence and human tracking has been created among the communities of 15 project villages
- ❖ 110 widows are motivated on the importance of having a personal saving bank accounts and initiated opening saving bank accounts.
- ❖ 110 widows are enhanced with the basic knowledge and scientific ways of livestock rearing and 80% widows have initiated different kinds of livestock rearing.
- ❖ 110 widows are taught on different methods and techniques of food processing, preparing quality food product, enhancing flavour, colour and taste etc.
- ❖ 110 widows are motivated on engaging in small business activities of buying and selling to generate additional income for the family.
- The awareness on the rights and equality of the girl child in the society has been created among the target communities.
- The rural women are enabled to realize their rights and equality as well as the potentials to contribute for the family and development of the society.
- ❖ 110 widows have initiated income generation activities with the livelihood financial support of Rs.6000/-. They have started different IGAs − 62 widows with piglets, 21 widows with goats, 11 widows with cows, 8 widows with ducks, 3 widows engage in weaving, and 5 widows with petty shops.

Women Federation Groups Activities

Guwahati Gana Seva Society (GGSS)

The women of rural villages are empowered and strengthened to improve their socio-economic life through various activities of federation groups. GGSS is closely working with the members of the federation groups and SHGs. There are 4 federation groups such as Basundhara Federation, Tamulpur; Notun Jivan Federation, Nagrijuli; Nabajagaran Federation, Kumarikatta; and Shining Star Federation, Sashipur. The members are given opportunities to be part of different training and livelihood program activities. They are enhanced with income generating activities.



Emergency Humanitarian Relief Response to the Victims of Flood 2023

Guwahati Gana Seva Society (GGSS)

Guwahati Gana Seva Society (GGSS) had extended humanitarian services to the victims of natural disaster in Morigaon district of Assam 2023. The vulnerable families who had been affected by the effects of the flood were in need of external help and support to combat the effects of flood disaster. The unpredicted harmful effects of the flood affected every normal livelihood of the vulnerable families. It had damaged their houses, properties and livestock, crops and agricultural land, road and communications, and forced them to live in temporary relief camps. There was suddenly immediate need for food materials and other essential commodities for the people living in the temporary relief camps to combat the effects of the flood disaster. The emergency humanitarian relief response enabled the affected families to respite their crisis and struggle for food and other essential commodities. Hence, the humanitarian concern and service provided by GGSS with the help of Manos Unidas, Spain had given a great relief to the 921 flood affected families of 10 villages in Morigaon district. GGSS spent total amount of Rs. 17,44,962.00 to support and help 4749 individuals who had been affected by the effects of flood disaster in Morigaon district of Assam.



Humanitarian Response to the Displaced Populations of Ethnic Violence in Manipur 2023

Guwahati Gana Seva Society (GGSS) extended its humanitarian concern and service to the displaced populations who had been affected by the ethnic violence in Manipur. Due to the sudden eruption of ethnic violence in few districts of Manipur state, the people were forced to vacate their homes and live in temporary relief camps for the safety of their precious lives. A great number of people migrated to neighbouring states for shelter and safety. The displaced populations also migrated to Guwahati city and took shelter in it. The emergency humanitarian relief response was carried out both in Guwahati city of Assam and Manipur. The generous contributions of the faithful of the Archdiocese of Guwahati and other parts of India had greatly strengthened GGSS to reach out those victimized populations of Manipur, GGSS had been an instrumental in organizing and channelizing the essential commodities of food, clothes and utensils that were generously contributed from the other parts of India. The displaced population of ethnic violence were assisted with emergency relief materials such as food, hygiene kits, clothes and utensils. The essential commodities of food and hygiene kits were directly distributed to 500 displaced families in Churachandpur district and 221 migrated families in Guwahati city. The clothes and utensils were sent to the Archdiocesan Social Service Centre of Imphal and distributed to the affected families living in different relief camps in different districts of Manipur. The total amount of Rs. 13,38,441/-was spent to help and support the displaced populations of ethnic violence in Manipur.





POHAR – THE EDUCATIONAL AID 2024

Guwahati Gana Seva Society (GGSS) has extended its help and support to the poor students through Pohar-The Education Aid. A minimum financial support of Rs. 5000/- was given to every student to meet the basic educational expenses. The students were selected from different educational institutions based on the economic conditions of the families. The valuable support and help of the principals of the institutions has strengthened GGSS to reach out those poor students whose parents struggle to pay their educational expenses. In this academic year 2024, 28 students from 14 different educational institutions that are run by the Archdiocese of Guwahati are supported through the **Pohar-Education Aid 2024.**
